Benefits to Early Transition Planning

- Once the youth turns 18
 the expectation is that
 they are fully prepared and
 able to make their own
 decisions. Otherwise, they
 must have the support
 team in place to aid in
 decision making.
- will help ease the change from child to adult services, and ensure the future adult has the support they want and need.
- It is beneficial to the child and family to utilize the support of the Alberta school system and other child services before adulthood (18+).

Key Things to Consider

- ☐ Is the child capable of communicating their needs & wants regarding their care?
- ☐ Is the child able to adequately feed, clothe & otherwise take care of their basic needs?
- ☐ Is the child able to develop social support networks?
- ☐ What mental health & wellness options need to be explored?
- ☐ Whether the child is employed outside of the home
- ☐ Whether the child will require outside care (dependent vs independent living)
- Degree to which the child can understand the effects & consequences of their actions
- ☐ Income and finances of the child and the child's family
- □ Does the child require an official diagnosis & assessment?

Obtaining Official Diagnosis

Most developmental disability supports and services require an official assessment and diagnosis (beyond Individual Program Plans (<u>IPP</u>)) to be completed before the age of 18 (and valid within the past 5 years). This process must be done by a registered Psychologist under the health professions act.

Individuals with developmental disabilities and their families are encouraged to advocate and request psycho-educational assessment to be done within the Alberta education system before the individual turns 18. This may avoid potential additional costs and delaying of adult funding (eg. PDD). Some great resources for further information are teachers, school counselors, Family School Liaison Workers (FSLW), as well as Family Services for Children with Disabilities Workers (FSCD).
